

## 27 T.S. Eliot: Poet and Mystic Paul Murray OP



# 28 Acts: Coping with Crisis Kieran O'Mahony OSA

## 1. Centering Prayer: "Be still, and know God" through Silent Prayer

Our first meeting will be to discuss what book we might undertake. Depending on the book, it could be good for people to undertake sections of a chapter and to present a summary and a reaction before opening it to the floor.

Bach, as researcher and musical scientist, brings a phenomenal mind to bear on the persuasive power of his music, always at the service of God, beauty and faith. The synergy is thrilling and repays close attention. Particular consideration will be given to the St John's Passion, as well as selected cantatas.
