
EDITO

THREE QUESTIONS TO THE PROMOTER OF JUSTICE AND PEACE FOR EUROPE AND THE MIDDLE EAST



Brother Xabier Gomez

promoter of Justice and Peace for Europe and the Middle East, recently appointed director of the Migration Service of the Spanish Episcopal Conference.

An interview with Sister Marie Monnet.

1) You are the new director of the Migration Service of the Spanish Episcopal Conference. What is your job?

My work consists of guiding, accompanying, coordinating and promoting the pastoral care of migrants in all the dioceses of Spain. I also organize and design for the Spanish Church the materials for the World Day of Migrants and Refugees; I am in charge of offering training to the diocesan delegates and taking care of networking. We are almost 70 dioceses working in a network and the Department is also part of a network called Migrants with Rights where CONFER (Conference of Religious, Caritas and Justice and Peace Spain) are present. It is a work of accompaniment, taking care of the identity of this mission area, its transversality and its harmony with the four verbs proposed by Pope Francis (welcome, protect, promote and integrate) and what is proposed to us from the Vatican section for Migrants and Refugees. We also deal with the relationship with public administrations and social advocacy when we believe it is convenient.

I work more closely with three advisory teams: one is a representation of diocesan delegates by geographical areas; another is on Minors and Young Migrants and the third is the chaplains of the CIEs, (internment center for foreigners), a very hard place where they intern people who are going to be expelled or deported.

2) In your opinion, how are we particularly concerned about this problem as Christians?

All the recent Popes have dealt a lot with the phenomenon of migration. They have defined it as one of the most important "signs of the times" for the Church; a theological place and a place to verify our coherence and adherence to the Gospel of Jesus and the Social Teaching of the Church. With Pope Francis and Fratelli Tutti it has gained great momentum. It is a reality that affects all regions of a world where everything is connected. Pope Francis has often denounced the "globalization of indifference" or individualism, hatred of the poor or the migrant and continues to want to awaken us to a spirituality, solidarity and hospitality that looks people in the eye, listens to them, puts their dignity at the center and promotes the common good. I believe that lately there is a perverse narrative that is manipulating information and trying to instill in the population and in many Catholics fear and rejection of those who are different. Christians should be concerned about everything that touches human dignity, we are responsible for the destiny of others, because Jesus has taught us so.

Sometimes I miss this audacity, this conversion of heart capable of not being dragged down by bad policies, bad practices and by those who seek to make migrants a "scapegoat" that distracts us from the focus of social problems. It is social justice that the Church seeks and longs for. Fraternity is the way of the Gospel. It is not right to confront those who suffer from precariousness and not address the causes of that precariousness. It is not the migrants that worry many, it is the impoverished migrants. This fear of the poor is something that must be faced head on. And address the causes of human mobility in all its aspects. For example, we cannot complain about Senegalese fishermen emigrating when the big European fishing companies are plundering with their fishing techniques what for centuries has kept the population of Senegal's coasts alive and fixed. The same is true of countries in conflict: where are the weapons manufactured with which so many get rich? Who sells them? Or with the problems arising from climate change.



3) Is migration an opportunity or too great a risk for host nations?

It is undoubtedly an opportunity. In Spain, migrants contribute to revitalize the Church and the economy. And they would do even more if they had easier access to work permits. I understand that there are places in Europe where there are conflicts, but it is not a factor of cultural diversity, it is a matter of social justice, lack of social cohesion. How can it be that Europe does not have the means to prevent or manage these social differences, the coexistence programs, etc. In many places it is necessary to review what has not been done well, but, above all, we must not lose hope to rethink and focus on trying solutions. In my city I live with diversity, it is possible and it is enriching when there is reciprocity. But this reciprocity cannot be improvised, it requires patience, wisdom and investment. Isn't Europe a community of nations with different cultures, languages and realities? However, there is much more that unites us: the desire to grow, to live and to leave a better world to our children is the same in all countries, cultures and religions. Let us focus on this from the perspective of our faith.

The Church is Catholic, universal by identity and vocation, no baptized person is a stranger or should feel a foreigner in our communities. There we have a witness to offer. Welcoming, diverse, inclusive communities.

Let us return to the values of Christian humanism that forged our continent, but let us return above all to the Gospel.
